

## July 5th, 2020 Fourteenth Sunday in Ordínary Tíme

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ Jesus,

"Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

A life of virtue is its own reward, and there is great confidence in being where God has called you to be and doing what God has called you to do. These two truths combine in the peace of the soul that comes from embracing your vocation from God. As I reflect on ten years of priesthood, this has been my experience. The greatest causes of stress in my life have all been the result of my own pride, jealousy, selfishness, and other sins. The greatest sources of joy in my life have been the fruits of working in God's service. Our vocations are our own personal calls to holiness, our calls to beatitude and the life of our heavenly homeland.

Our ultimate goal is eternal life with God in heaven, so it makes sense that our greatest happiness in this life will be to make our world as heaven-like as possible. We pray, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven, and then we work to make it happen. Rather than doing evil and causing suffering for others, we seek to lift each other up and ease our neighbor's burdens. We do this for others, but do we ever think of trying to make our own lives more heavenly? Do we seek to sanctify our own lives and the lives of our spouses and children? Do we really, consciously conform our will to God's Will for us? When was the last time you prayed: "Lord Jesus, what would You have me do?" We pray seriously about our vocations when we are discerning and preparing to enter into them, but do we continue to discern after we make our vows? Do we live out our vocations with the same philosophy of "Thy will be done" applied personally?

This week's Gospel encourages us to take Jesus seriously in His offer to guide us in our daily labors. His burdens are lighter. His yoke is easier than the one we would make for ourselves. Why reject happiness when the greatest possible beatitude is offered to us by the God Who made us for His own purposes? May we have the grace this day and each day to trust God, our Creator, that He will equip us with the gifts we need to answer His call and to embrace it with our whole hearts.

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#### Article from Renee Doll:

Have you heard of the vocation: **Consecrated Virgin Living in the World?** I was unfamiliar with it until several years ago. Since then, I have been learning more and more about this ancient vocation.

So, what is this vocation? Why have many not heard of it? How does one learn more about it?

Consecrated Virginity is one of the oldest recognized forms of consecrated life in the Catholic Church. It is actually as old as apostolic times. Blessed Virgin Mary was actually the first Consecrated Virgin. Women at that time, who had a desire to give their lives totally to Christ, who chose not to marry but live a life of prayer and sacrifice for the Lord, would express their wishes to make a lifelong commitment to religious authority. In those days, these women often lived with their family for safety concerns.

This went on for many years until the start of monasteries and convents. Many women then joined other women with the same purpose in mind. There became less Consecrated Virgins living in the world as were known, but there has always been some. They never died out. Some well known consecrated virgins from the early church include: St. Agnes, St. Agatha, St. Cecilia and St. Lucy.

In 1970, the actual Rite for Consecrated Virgins was renewed, and today, more and more women are interested in joining the age-old "Order of Virgins". There are around 5,000 Consecrated Virgins living today throughout the world. Consecrated Virginity is not the same as becoming a member of a women's religious institute.

# Trusting in Humility

The dream for world peace ever stirs the heart of humanity. Imagine a world where nations stopped their aggression, where terrorists laid down their weapons of mass destruction, and where nations respected one another's territories and customs.

Closer to home, imagine a neighborhood where people got along, where diversity was treasured, and where violence was no more. We all long for the security that comes from peace.

Many nations, however, still hold that peace comes from a well-built arsenal. Leaders believe that a strong defense inhibits aggression and causes the desired peace.

But the prophet Zechariah envisions another kind of leader. He sees one who is just, who rescues people from their oppression. Meek, he rides a simple beast of burden, and yet his dominion extends all across the world. This leader accomplishes the desired gift of peace not from weapons, not from intimidation, but from the example of humility.

Our leaders will continue to put their trust in weapons as long as we do too. If we live in trust, we can build a place where peace will reign from sea to sea. Imagine the world at peace. Imagine it starting with you.



The rules you apply to the oldest child might bend when the youngest comes of age. Procedures you follow at work might be put aside to help someone in need. Rules are good. They help society live in peace. But if the rules become tyrants, they thwart the very order they aim to preserve.


St. Paul cautions the Romans, "You are not in the flesh; on the contrary, you are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you."

In the past, the Romans had lived according to the law of the flesh. They did what they could get away with. They observed rules for the sake of survival. But now they are Christians. The Spirit of God dwells within them. They live now by the law of love. They make decisions differently, thinking of others, not just of themselves.

The rules we live by deserve to be followed especially as they express the desires of God's Holy Spirit. The Spirit of love presents the supreme law. As Christians, we please God when we obey the Spirit of Christ.

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
